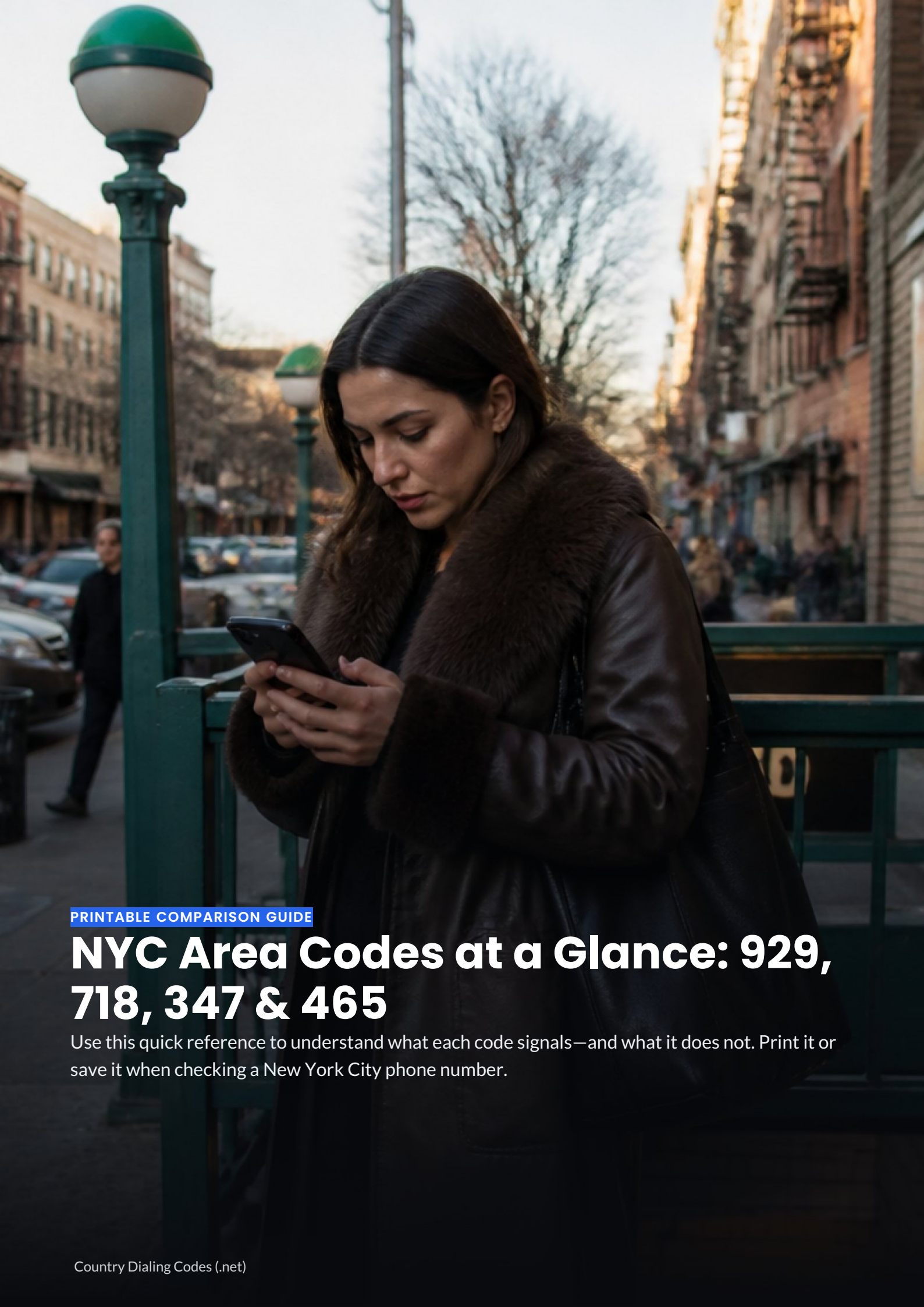

NYC Area Codes at a Glance: 929, 718, 347 & 465

Use this quick reference to understand what each code signals—and what it does not. Print it or save it when checking a New York City phone number.

The four codes compared

Area code	Broad territory	Relationship	Practical meaning
718	Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens, Staten Island, and Marble Hill	Original outer-borough code	An established number in the shared region
347	Same broad outer-borough region	Overlay with 718 and 929	Additional established numbering resource
929	Same broad outer-borough region	Overlay with 718 and 347	An active NYC outer-borough number
465	Same broad region as 347, 718, 917, and 929	New overlay	For new services after existing numbering resources are exhausted

What to remember

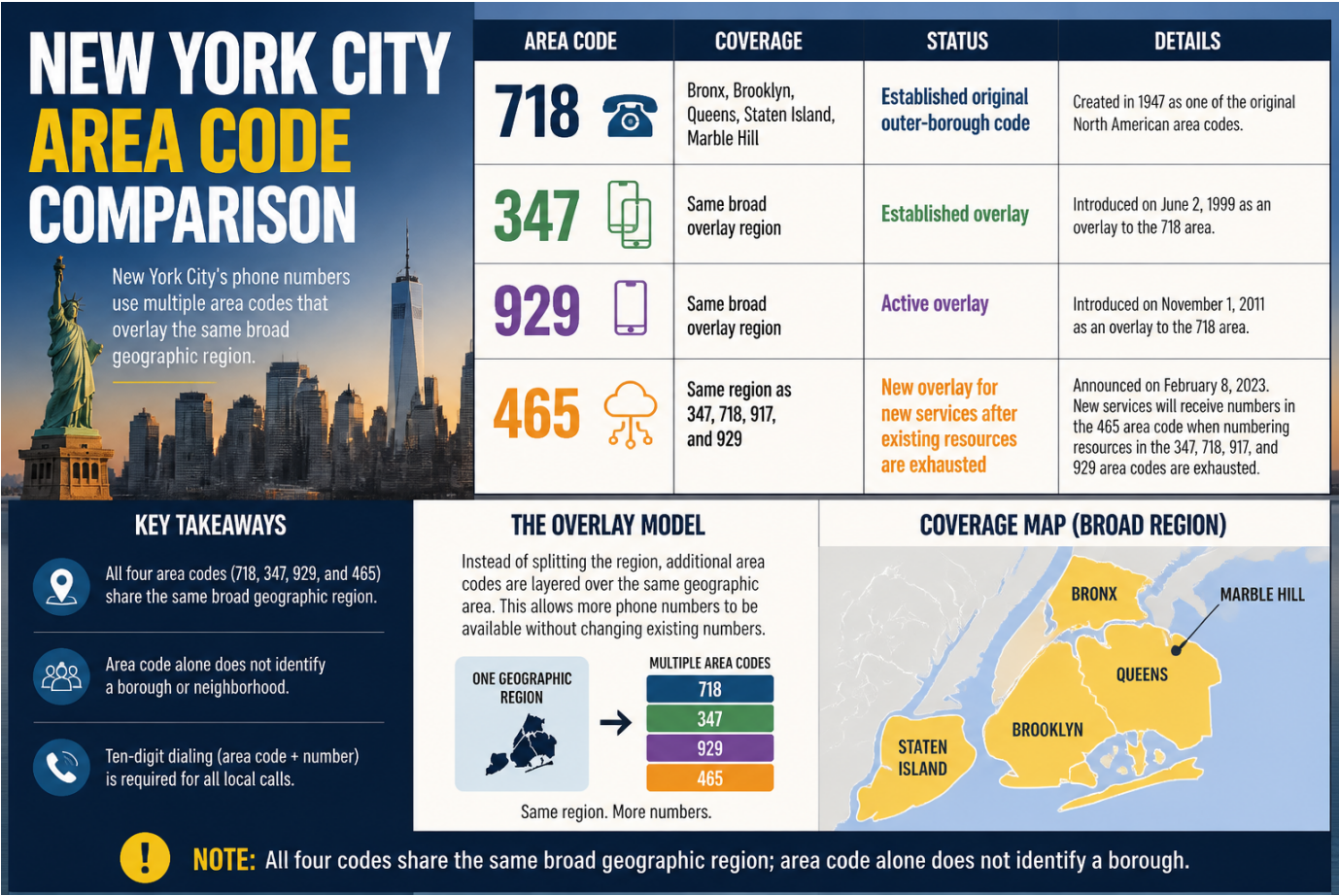
All four codes can serve the Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens, Staten Island, and Marble Hill.

718 is the oldest of the four and has the strongest historical association with New York City's outer boroughs.

465 follows the same geographic logic and is intended for future assignments after existing resources are exhausted.

They are overlapping codes, not four exclusive geographic zones.

347 and 929 expanded the available numbering pool through overlays.



i **Calling rule**

Because the codes overlap, do not try to infer a precise borough from the first three digits. Use the complete area code and telephone number.

Area-code information describes numbering assignments, not a caller's identity, present location, or legitimacy.
